RESIDENTS and visitors alike will soon be able to delight in some very creative roadside art along the footpath and retaining walls of Bold Street, as part of Port

Macquarie Hastings Council's \$1 million upgrade of the precinct. When the on-going upgrade is complete, Max Scott is installing the first

of his 'shark' and 'crab' engraved concrete blocks on to Bold Street. The 'shark' and 'crab' inspired display was drawn from the totems of the traditional custodians of the

Hastings, the Birpai people.

As the artwork educationally raises awareness of the local flora and fauna indigenous to the Camden Haven area a colouring-in competition based on Max Scott's designs is now open across schools and child-care centres in the area.



"All up there will be four totems, two sharks and two crabs," the local artist said.

"It's about a weeks work on each carving. We hope to have everything finished by December," he told the Courier.

Other works will include brass embedded shapes along with timber artworks based on four themes - Beach and Ocean, Heath Lands, Rivers and Lakes, and Mountains.

Area 14 plans on display

Community members are invited to attend a meeting to discuss the future plans for the new Rainbow Beach residential area.

The meeting will be held at Bonny Hills Community Hall at 7pm on Tuesday September 23 and will provide an overview of planning for development between Lake Cathie and Bonny Hills.

Developers of Area 14 from the St Vincents Foundation, plan to provide the community with an update of plans for

the estate which has been lodged as a Major Project Application with the NSW Planning Department.

The Bonny Hills and Lake Cathie Progress Associations anticipate that infrastructure such as schools, open space, walking, cycling routes, and landscaping of the developed areas, will be included.

Planning for wildlife corridors and koala habitat are also expected to be outlined.



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
