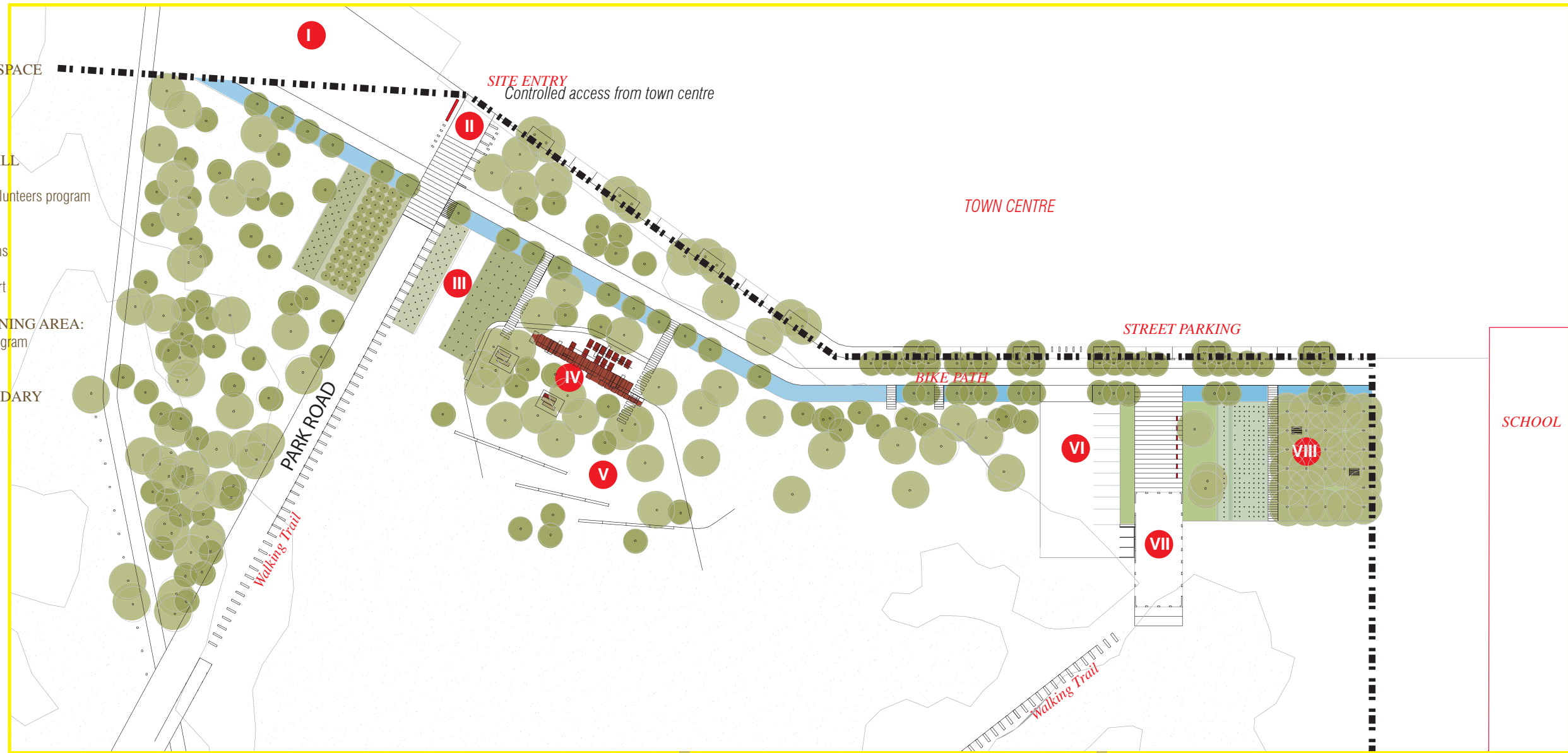

Regional Park defines a reserved area of land in a natural or modified landscape that is suitable for public recreation and enjoyment in a sustainable manner. The NPW refer to a regional park near large population centres, these parks offer open space and recreational and cultural opportunities for urban residents. Their environments have often been largely altered since colonisation.

Park the land acquired for reservation under the *National Parks and Wildlife Act, 1974*.

Statement of Management Intent is a document, which sets out the planning context for proposed works within land reserved under the *National Parks and Wildlife Act, 1974* prior to the adoption of a Plan of management.

Plan of management means a plan of management as defined under Part 5 of the *National Parks and Wildlife Act, 1974*.

Advisory committee means an advisory committee constituted under the *National Parks and Wildlife Act, 1974*.

Regional advisory committee means an advisory committee constituted under section 24 (2) of the *National Parks and Wildlife Act, 1974*.

Development area means that part of the site area capable of having a building constructed on it exclusive of:

- Land where development is not permissible under the LEP.
- Land that is constrained by being flood and/or fire prone or subject to instability.

Place of Aboriginal heritage means:

- A place that has the physical remains of pre-European occupation by, or is of contemporary significance to the Aboriginal people. It can (but need not) include items and remnants of the occupation of the land by Aboriginal people such as burial places, engraving sites, rock art, midden deposits, scarred and sacred trees and sharpening grooves.
- A natural aboriginal sacred site or other sacred feature. It includes natural features such as creeks or mountains of long-standing cultural significance, as well as initiation, ceremonial or story places or areas of more contemporary cultural significance.

Public open space means land used, or intended for use, for recreational purposes by the public.

Council means either the Council of the City of Liverpool or the Council of the City of Campbelltown.

Cultural heritage encompasses past and present cultural associations of all people in Australia, including tradition knowledge and customs. It can be tangible (i.e. have physical manifestations such as art buildings etc.) or intangible (i.e. spiritual or social associations, songs, stories and cultural practices). Cultural significance includes values that are social, spiritual, aesthetic, historic and scientific. When natural resources acquire meaning for a particular group, they become cultural resources as well.

Pest species means a species occurring in an area outside its historically known natural range as a result of intentional or accidental dispersal by human activities.
