# Eviron Road Quarry and Landfill

# What is the proposed Project?

# Introduction

As a result of the expanding population in the Tweed area increasing pressures are being placed on local resources and infrastructure. In particular, there is increasing demand being placed on waste management services. As such, this is an area that Tweed Shire Council has identified as being of high priority to address. Based upon Council data, it is predicted that Council's existing landfill, Stott's Creek landfill, is nearing capacity and is expected to be full by 2011. Council has been acquiring land in close proximity to this site for the purposes of investigation for use for future landfill area. Under the Tweed Local Environmental Plan 2000 (LEP) the land owned by Council is appropriately zoned (5(a) Special Purposes) for the purposes of developing a landfill. Tweed Shire Council is proceeding with investigation and design. This land is earmarked for the future Tweed Botanic Gardens.

# The Landfill

A new landfill is proposed to be situated within the void created by the completion of excavations at Quirk's Quarry (just east of the Pacific Highway, off Eviron Road at Eviron). This quarry is currently in use, however is expected to exhaust the rock resources within the next two years. The landfill design will be undertaken in accordance with Best Practice Environmental Management and the NSW EPA Solid Waste Landfill Guidelines (1996) and will include:

- A fully engineered liner system;
- A leachate extraction system;
- A landfill gas extraction system;
- A comprehensive closure, post closure and site rehabilitation plan taking into account the Botanic Gardens Master Plan.



The landfill project also includes the construction of an internal haul road from the existing Stotts Creek landfill such that the existing resource recovery facilities and weighbridge at the landfill can be utilised at the new Quirk's Quarry landfill site. Council plans to fully rehabilitate the landfill at the end of its life, and the area will eventually become part of the Tweed Botanic Gardens.

# The Quarry

As the existing Council quarry, Quirks Quarry will become a landfill, the proposal will also investigate situating a new Council quarry within the land at Eviron. Studies are currently underway to determine the most appropriate location and size of this new quarry, taking into particular consideration the environmental sensitivity of the area and availability of quarry resource. The proposed location of this quarry is to be either within North Valley or West Valley within the site (see map) depending upon the outcome of the initial studies. The new haul road will also service this new quarry, serving to reduce heavy vehicle traffic on Eviron Road and nearby roads.

# Future Development

While Tweed Shire Council is currently applying for the landfill and quarry as described above, future development of the site is also being considered. It is intended once the resource at the first new quarry is exhausted and the Quirks Quarry landfill is at capacity, the void created by the first quarry would then be utilised as a landfill similar to the process undertaken at Quirks Quarry. Again, concurrently, a second new quarry will be developed and eventually used as a landfill. This part of the project is not expected to proceed until after 2018. Ultimately the entire site is intended to become the location for the Tweed Botanic Gardens, and site rehabilitation will consider this future landuse.

# Why this site?

This site was identified by Tweed Shire Council as a site suitable for quarrying and landfill in the late 1990s. While it is recognised that the site has some physical characteristics and constraints, Council has no other suitable site available for the quarry and landfill requirements of the Shire. However, as a requirement of the Environmental Assessment, alternatives and justification of the project will be investigated and addressed in the final EA report.

# What has been done so far?

Council has prepared a Preliminary Environmental Assessment including an overall Concept Plan for the site which was submitted to the Department of Planning in 2008. The project was designated as a Major Project under Part 3A of the NSW Environmental Planning and Assessment Act, 1979 (EP&A Act). The Director-General of the Department of Planning has outlined a targeted assessment regime by defining key environmental issues within Director-General's Requirements. The investigation of these issues will be presented within an Environmental Assessment. The key issues are outlined in the section below.

Tweed Shire Council has engaged consultants GHD to undertake the Environmental Assessment to address the Director-General's Requirements environmental impacts of the proposed quarrying and landfilling activities. The Director-General's Requirements and the Preliminary Environmental Assessment are available online through the Department of Planning's website (www.planning. nsw.gov.au).

# What studies will be undertaken for this project?

The Environmental Assessment will address general requirements of the Director-General's Requirements as well as comprise more detailed investigations from a number of disciplines including:

- Waste Management concept design of landfill
- Quarry preliminary quarry planning and investigations
- Soils and Water

- Stormwater Management and Erosion Control
- Noise Blasting and Vibration
- Air Quality and Odour
- Greenhouse Gas
- Biodiversity
- Transport
- Heritage (Aboriginal and Non-Indigenous)
- Visual
- Hazards
- Rehabilitation

Throughout the investigations community consultation will be conducted with various stakeholders. Once all the studies have been undertaken, an Environmental Assessment document will be prepared. This document will be on public exhibition online and at Tweed Shire Council in Murwillumbah.

# Council decides to continue with 7-Year Plan

OUNCIL has decided to continue with the implementation of the approved 7-Year Infrastructure and Services Plan and increases in the rates for general income.

The proposed increase in the general rate in 2009/10 is 9.5 per cent, subject to formal exhibition and adoption of the Budget.

Despite the proposed increase, the 2009/10 Draft Budget includes a \$958,530 reduction in Council service levels due to a funding shortfall.

The particular services and programs which will need to



be deferred or reduced is yet to be confirmed.

The shortfall is the result of uncontrollable expenditure increases such as electricity and street lighting costs and a reduction in income.

It is important to note that

the proposed increase is on the general rate only (not sewer and water, waste charges etc which will have increases ranging from 3.06 -4.06 per cent), so the overall percentage increase for the total rate bill will not be 9.5 per cent.

The Draft 2009/12 Management Plan, Draft 2009/10 Budget and Draft 2009/10 Fees and Charges are being prepared for consideration at the 21 April 2009 Council meeting.

The community will have the opportunity to comment on these documents when they go on exhibition.

# Parks may swap names

HE Tweed Heads Historical Society is campaigning to swap the names of two riverside parks at Tweed Heads.

The parks are Ebenezer Park, which runs along the Tweed River along Keith Compton Drive, and John Follent Park, near Duranbah Beach.

In a letter to Council, the Society said the Ebenezer tragedy occurred adjacent to what is now known as Follent Park and it would be more appropriate for this park to be re-named Ebenezer Park.

The Ebenezer was a 90-ton schooner which hit rocks while grounded on low tide on the north spit (near Duranbah Beach) on 30 July 1859. That night the weather deteriorated and the schooner was driven onto rocks. The crew escaped but the Ebenezer broke up so quickly that four members of the pioneering Boyd family were drowned.

John Follent Park honours Dr John Follent (1913-1996) a longstanding general practitioner in Tweed Heads and Coolangatta who was a driving force behind the establishment of a public hospital at Tweed Heads. He was also an honorary Anglican priest at St Cuthbert's Anglican Church.

According to the Society, the close proximity of both The Tweed Hospital and St Cuthbert's to the currently named Ebenzer Park is more fitting and it should be renamed Follent Park.

## **DEVELOPMENT APPLICATION NO. DA08/1233**

A designated Development Application has been lodged by Mr C Chandler seeking development consent for erection of twenty (20) power poles for supply to wholesale nursery adjacent to Clothiers Creek Road (from Sliprails Road to existing power pole on Clothiers Creek Road) located in unzoned and other zones including 7(I), 8(a), 1(c) and 2(d) at Lot 2 DP 804276; Lot 1 Road 5075; Lot 1 Road 1160, Clothiers Creek Road Bogangar; Sliprails Road and Clothiers Creek Road Tanglewood. Tweed Shire Council is the consent authority for the application.

The proposed development constitutes "Designated Development" pursuant to Section 77A of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act, 1979 (as amended) and Clause 4(1) and Schedule 3 of the accompanying Regulation.

The development involves:

- Erection of twenty (20) power poles for the supply of electricity to private wholesale nursery
- Clearing of vegetation
- Excavation for individual footings up to 2.2 metres

The development application and the documents accompanying it, including the relevant environmental impact statement may be inspected at Council's Murwillumbah and Tweed Heads Civic Centres. The application will also be available at the Department of Planning's offices in Grafton and Sydney.

Inspection may be undertaken during ordinary office hours for a period of thirty (30) days from Wednesday 25 March 2009 to Tuesday 28 April 2009.

Any person may, during the above period, make a written submission to the General Manager of Council. Any person may, during the above period, make a written submission to the General Manager of Council. It should also be noted that Council has adopted a policy whereby, on request, any submission including identifying particulars will be made public. Council will give consideration to the "Public Interest" and requests for confidentiality by submitters in determining access to submission letters. However, the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act, 1989 may result in confidential submissions being released to an applicant.

Any submission objecting to the proposed development must state the ground upon which such objection is made. Further, any person who makes a submission by way of objection and who is dissatisfied with Council's determination in relation to the matter may appeal to the Land and Environment Court in accordance with Section 98 of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act, 1979 (as amended). If a Commission of Inquiry is held, the Minister's determination of the application is final and not subject to appeal.

# Commitment

Tweed Shire Council is committed to the development of viable recycled water schemes where possible. The Tweed Shire Council Recycled Water Initiative is part of Council's Integrated Water Cycle Management Strategy. This strategy includes the preparation of an Effluent Reuse Opportunites Report.

# **Recycled Water Opportunities**

The above report identifies several potential reuse projects:

- Arkinstall Park Municipal Oval and Tweed Heads Cemetery.
- Barry Sheppard Oval, Cabarita Beach Pony Club and the Les Burger Field at Bogangar.
- The Chinderah Golf Course and the Chinderah Ti Tree Plantation.
- Council's nursery at Uki.
- Turf farm at Round Mountain Road.

# Sustainability benefits

With the rapid increase in population occurring in the Tweed Shire Council area, there is an increase in demand on the potable supply system. Recycled water use will have a number of important water conservation and sustainability benefits, the key ones being:

- Substitution of potable water currently used for irrigating Council parks and reserves.
- Reduction in ground water extraction by private land owners.
- Economic benefits from developments in irrigated agriculture and industry able to access a reliable recycled water supply for restricted (non-potable) uses.
- Redirection of the nutrient loads from discharging into local waterways to a beneficial application to irrigated pastures and crops.
- Reduction in the volume of treated water released into local waterways.
- Reduction in the volume of raw water extracted from river and groundwater sources, providing enhanced protection of environmental flows and dependent ecosystems.

# Water reuse strategy continued

# Existing recycled water users

Recycled water projects already in use include:

- Irrigation of the Coolangatta-Tweed Heads Golf Club which has been using recycled water for more than 20 years.
- Irrigation of the Chinderah Golf Course which was approved in January 2009 using recycled water direct from the Kingscliff Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- Council operated koala feed tree eucalyptus plantation at Uki.
- Irrigation of pasture at Tyalgum.
- Use of recycled water for cooling at Murwillumbah Sugar Mill reusing up to 100 per cent at dry weather flow from Murwillumbah Wastewater Treatment Plant.

## What is recycling?

Recycling is the use of treated wastewater for beneficial use other than drinking, such as irrigation of parks, sports fields and crops, domestic garden watering and toilet flushing.

## What does it involve?

There are a number of non-potable recycling options available including:

- Providing water for irrigation to local farmers, through the development of a treatment, storage and delivery system.
- Developing schemes to irrigate council-owned lands such as parks and sports fields with recycled water rather than from the drinking water supply.
- Installing 'third-pipe' systems in new developments. These systems provide recycled water to homes for use in toilets, laundries and gardens. 'Third pipe' refers to the additional pipe installed to each home, along with drinking water and sewerage pipes.



## Community consultation process

This includes:

- Providing factual information to explain what recycled water is.
- Seeking feedback and allowing time for community questions to be answered.
- Providing a FREECALL phone line to register interest.
- Calling for submissions and feedback.
- Holding presentations, meetings and discussion days with groups and individuals.
